Subject: Fall 2024 Village Center Demographics

Overview: De Anza implemented six Village Centers aligned with each meta major in spring 2023: Artistic Expression (AE), Business and Finance (BF), Health and Life Science (HLS), Language and Communication (LC), Physical Sciences and Technology (PST), Social Sciences and Humanities (SSH). Each Village Center has a physical space and offers various events throughout the year. This report provides an overview of the demographics of students who visited a village center in fall 2024. In fall 2024 there were 1,629 visits from 1,019 unique students.

Methodology: Student ids were provided to the research office by the Guided Pathways team. Ids were matched to fall enrollment. This resulted in 1,075 ids provided with 1,020 matches, for a match rate of 95%. The count of students represents unique student counts.
