Hello students! Thank you for registering for our class and for choosing to study at De Anza! Our class is an asynchronous online class, which means we will not have any class meetings. Instead, you will do all your assignments on Canvas. You will have to be very diligent and make sure you meet all the weekly assignment deadlines. This really requires a lot of discipline and self-motivation. You are responsible for doing your work on time, studying on your own, and getting help when you need it. You must make sure to check Canvas and your email often. I will send you announcements on Canvas regularly.

I hope that you will be able to put in the time and effort it takes to succeed! Please plan on devoting a minimum of 10 hours per week for homework. If you need extra help or have questions, please email me. I will respond within 24 hours (but usually a lot sooner!). I also encourage you to meet with me during my Zoom office hours and/or my in-person office hours on campus. Do **not** use the inbox on Canvas to contact me (I don't check that inbox). Tutors and counselors are also available virtually and in-person for additional help (see the links at the end of this document). We all want to help you learn and succeed! Let's work together, be kind and patient with each other, and learn a lot!

Please note that all writing assignments will be checked using a plagiarism detecting software program. This software detects any use of AI (e.g., Chat GPT, Google translate, Grammarly, etc.). In past quarters, many students have failed their assignments because they used AI and/or plagiarized from other sources. Please do not do this. Please do your own work.

ESL 273 (credit)/473 (noncredit) is an advanced-level course for students whose native language is not English. In the course, you will be introduced to the principles of the essay so that you can be prepared for college-level writing. The goal of this course is to develop your **voice** as a writer!

1. Write well-developed essays that analyze and synthesize main ideas and differing viewpoints from a variety of academic reading materials.
2. Demonstrate advanced grammar, sentence structure, and vocabulary in writing.
3. Evaluate own writing for rhetorical structure and clarity by means of revision and editing.

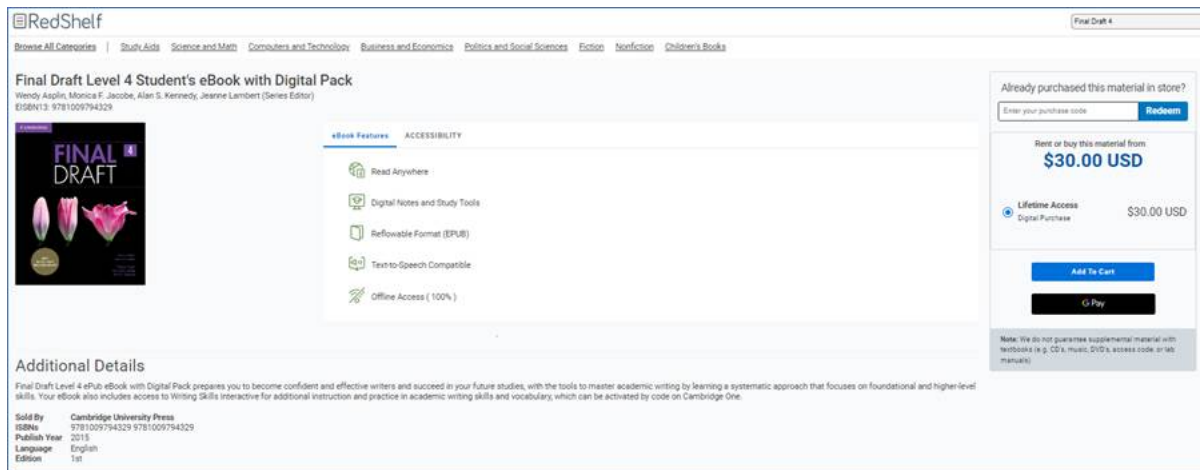
PREREQUISITE

ESL 261/461 and 265/465 with a grade of C or better; or a qualifying placement by the ESL Guided Self-Placement Assessment.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

2. Access to a computer and the Internet to complete and submit assignments
3. An advanced English-only, English learner's dictionary (paper or online)

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- ❖ **Preparedness, Collaboration & Participation:** In order to be successful in this class, you should:
 - Check Canvas regularly and often to check assignments and due dates.
 - Check Canvas Announcements regularly. I will post announcements weekly (usually multiple times per week).

- Work willingly and cooperatively with your classmates in pairs and groups.
- Take responsibility for your own learning process.
- Ask for help if you are not doing well in class (don't wait until the last minute!).

❖ ***Independence and Time Management:*** This is an **asynchronous** class, which means that we will not have scheduled class meeting times. This class requires excellent time management skills, which means that you must schedule your time wisely so that you can successfully complete every assignment. It is your responsibility to follow the weekly modules on Canvas, do your assignments, and submit them by the due dates. Every Thursday, I will post the new module for the upcoming week.

Course Content

Homework: You will have various homework assignments based on the readings from the textbook and/or our writing assignments. All assignments must be submitted on Canvas by the due date and time.

Your assignments may be used as examples in class so I can give constructive feedback. This feedback will help the whole class learn how to write more effectively.

Quizzes: You will have several quizzes that test the skills covered in the text. All quizzes assignments must be submitted on Canvas by the due date and time.

Essays: You will write a total four expository essays: two multi-draft essays and two timed essays. The first timed essay will be the midterm test. The last timed essay will be the final exam. All essays must be submitted on Canvas by the due date and time. I will give you feedback on your submitted work using Speedgrader and Turnitin. Some feedback will be written, some will be an oral recording. Please check your feedback and visit me during my office hours with any questions.

Final Exam Essay Due: Monday, March 24th at 9:00AM

Note: Late assignments will not be accepted. Make sure to submit your assignments by the due dates!

Writing and Reading Center (WRC): You are required to work with a tutor in the WRC for five hours over the quarter (10 thirty-minute sessions or 5 one-hour sessions). A tutor can help you with your essays, reading assignments, and grammar. You can sign up for a weekly tutor or you can drop-in during open hours to get help. Of course, you can meet with a tutor for more than five hours, and this is strongly encouraged! You can meet with a tutor online via Zoom or in-person on campus. If you cannot go to the WRC, you may also work with a tutor on Smarthinking or NetTutor. Both can be accessed on Canvas (left margin of Home page). For Smarthinking, you just submit your

work and get written feedback. Each submission/feedback will count for 20 minutes. For NetTutor, you can have live sessions.

To record your hours, make sure to take a screenshot of your sessions or provide other written proof of your sessions. Your screenshots/proof must include the date, time, and duration of the session as well as your name/picture and the tutor's name/picture. Submissions are due in Week 11.

- **Use any AI technology, e.g. ChatGPT, Google Translate, Grammarly, etc.**
- Copy from another student's homework, quiz, exam or any other material.
- Have someone else do your assignment and submit it as your own.
- Submit homework or essays that you've done for another class.
- Get too much "help" from someone on an assignment where the work no longer looks like your own.
- Copy any amount of material from a published source (e.g. the Internet, books, magazines) without citing the source.

Any student caught cheating, submitting work generated by AI, or plagiarizing will receive an **automatic 0** for the assignment and may be dropped from the course and/or reported to the Office of Student Development. Students who help someone else cheat in any way may also receive an automatic zero and be reported. If reported, the incident may remain as part of your permanent college record.
